General: Based on Interviews, a caregiver used a diabetic child's glucose meter to check the blood sugar level of a non-diabetic child after lunch on 7/20/16. Interview determined the caregiver used a clean lancet to prick the child's finger. A strip was placed in the glucose meter and then touched the protruding end of the strip to a drop of the child's blood. A sample of blood was syphoned into the strip for a blood sugar level reading. The child's blood sugar level was normal. The needle and the strip used to check the child's blood sugar were discarded.
