General: Based on observation, the surveyor found the fo	ollowing:	

1. A can of Mt. Dew soda was observed on a shelf in the Preschool Room. Through interview, the surveyor learned that the soda belonged to a staff person. The soda was within reach of the children.

2. A cell phone charging cord was within reach of the children in the classroom for the two- and three-year-old children.

3. A toilet brush and plunger were observed in an unlocked storage room. The toilet brush and plunger were accessible to the children.

(a) Six (6) hours of cabinet-approved orientation within the first three (3) months of employment;

(b) Nine (9) hours of cabinet-approved early care and education training within the first year of employment, including one and one-half (1 $\frac{1}{2}$) hours of cabinet-approved pediatric abusive head trauma training; and

(c) Fifteen (15) hours of cabinet-approved early care and education training during each subsequent year of employment, including one and onehalf (1 ½) hours of cabinet-approved pediatric abusive head trauma training completed once every five (5) years.

410 - Training

General: Based on review of documentation and ECE-TRIS, the surveyor found the following:

1. A staff (DOH: 1/23/19) completed six (6) hours of cabinet-approved orientation training on 6/22/19; thus, it was not within the first three (3) months of employment.

2. Verification of only eleven (11) hours of cabinet-approved early care and education annual training was found for a staff (DOH: 4/1/14).

Findings:

General: Based on observation during a tour of the childcare center, the surveyor found the following:

1. A bottle of hand sanitizer was on top of a two and one-half to three (2 ½ - 3) foot shelf located in the Preschool Room. The hand sanitizer was within reach and accessible to the children.

2. A purse was stored on a hook above a desk located in the Preschool Room. The purse was within reach and accessible to the children. Through interview, the surveyor confirmed that the purse belonged to staff in the classroom.

3. A storage room door was unlocked and open. The surveyor observed that a purse was on a child size seat near the door. Through interview, the surveyor found that the purse belonged to a staff person. The purse was within reach and accessible to the children.

4. Three (3) cans of paint and a staff's personal items were observed in an unlocked room adjacent to the School-age Room. Through interview, the surveyor learned that the room is used by a staff person that sometimes stays overnight at the childcare center. The items were accessible to the children.

585 - Water Supply Requirements

- (10) The water supply shall be:

General: Based on observation, the surveyor found that the spigot emitted only a small stream of cold water at the sink located in the restroom used by the children.

(10) When a child is diapered, the child shall:

(b) Be placed on a surface that is:

- 1. Clean;

3. Free of holes, rips, tears, or other damage;

6. Free of any items not used for diaper changing.

Findings:

General: Based on observation, the surveyor found tears in the vinyl covering on the diaper changing pad located in the Infant Room.

710 - Toy Sanitation Procedure

922 KAR 2:120. Section 11. Toys and Furnishings.

(4) A toy or another item that is considered a mouth contact surface by a child not toilet trained shall be sanitized daily by:

- (a)1. Scrubbing in warm, soapy water using a brush to reach into crevices;
- 2. Rinsing in clean water;

3. Submerging in a sanitizing solution for at least two (2) minutes; and

4. Air dried; or

(b) Cleaning in a dishwasher if the toy or other item is dishwasher safe.

Findings:

General: Based on interview, the surveyor found the following:

1. Staff in the classroom for the one-year-old children stated that they soak the mouth contact toys in bleach water for two to three (2-3) minutes and air dry. The staff confirmed this is the only step used to sanitize the mouth contact toys.

2. Staff in the Infant Room stated that they sanitize the mouth contact toys by spraying them with soapy water and then spraying them with bleach water or a solution of Virex; they then air dry. The staff confirmed this is the only step used to sanitize the mouth contact toys. First Aid/Medication

1. During a tour of the Afterschool Room, the surveyor found that five (5) Lidocaine patches were stored in an unlocked refrigerator. The medication was within reach and accessible to the children. The medication was not stored in a locked area.

2. During a tour of the Preschool Room, the surveyor observed a purse hanging on a hook in the classroom. A bottle of medication was sticking up from the top of the unzipped purse. Through interview, the surveyor learned the purse belonged to a staff person. The medication was not stored in a locked area.
