Findings: General: Based on review of documentation, a caregiver hired on 7/5/16, last completed the Pediatric Head Trauma Training on 7/16/14. 645 - Sink 922 KAR 2:120. Section 10. Toilet, Diapering, and Toiletry Requirements. (b) Equipped with hot and cold running water that allows for hand washing;

(c) Equipped with hot water at a minimum temperature of ninety (90) degrees Fahrenheit and a maximum of 120 degrees Fahrenheit;

(d) Equipped with liquid soap;

(e) Equipped with hand-drying blower or single use disposable hand drying material;

(f) Equipped with an easily cleanable waste receptacle; and

(g) Immediately adjacent to a changing area used for infants and toddlers.

Findings:

General: Based on observation, the hot water registered at one hundred twenty-six (126) degrees Fahrenheit at both sinks in the boys and girls' restrooms.

655 - Child Personal Care/Handwashing

922 KAR 2:120. Section 3. General Requirements.

(4) A child shall:

(a) Be helped with personal care and cleanliness based upon his or her developmental skills;

(b) Except as established in paragraph (c) of this subsection, wash his or her hands with liquid soap and warm running water:

1. a. Upon arrival at the center; or

b. Within thirty (30) minutes of arrival for school-age children;

2. Before and after eating or handling food;

3. After toileting or diaper change;

4. After handling animals;

5. After touching an item or an area of the body soiled with body fluids or wastes; and

6. After outdoor or indoor play time; and

(c) Use hand sanitizer or hand-sanitizing wipes if liquid soap and warm running water are not available in accordance with paragraph (b) of this subsection. The child shall wash the child's hands as soon as practicable once liquid soap and warm running water are available.

Findings:

General: Based on observation, seven (7) children hands were wiped with a cloth prior to eating lunch. Interview determined the children's hands were not washed with liquid soap and warm running water.

685 - Diaper Changing Area/Surface

922 KAR 2:120. Section 10. Toilet, Diapering, and Toiletry Requirements.

(10) When a child is diapered, the child shall:

(b) Be placed on a surface that is:

1. Clean;

2. Padded;

3. Free of holes, rips, tears, or other damage;

4. Nonabsorbent;

5. Easily cleaned; and

6. Free of any items not used for diaper changing.

Findings:

730 - Medication

General: Based on observation, there was less than a half (1/2) inch long tear on the diaper changing pad in the infants' room.

922 KAR 2:120. Section 7. First Aid and Medicine. (6) Medication, including refrigerated medication, shall be:

(a) Stored in a separate and locked place, out of the reach of a child unless the medication is:

1. A first aid supply and is maintained in accordance with subsection (1) of this section;

2. Diaper cream, sunscreen, or toothpaste. Diaper cream, sunscreen, or toothpaste shall be inaccessible to a child;

3. An epinephrine auto-injector. A licensed child-care center shall comply with KRS 199.8951 and 311.646, including:

a. An epinephrine auto-injector shall be inaccessible to a child;

b. A child-care center shall have at least one (1) person onsite who has received training on the administration of an epinephrine auto-injector if the child-care center maintains an epinephrine auto-injector;

c. A child-care center shall seek emergency medical care for a child if an auto-injector is administered to the child; and

d. A child-care center shall report to the child's parent and the cabinet in accordance with 922 KAR 2:090, Section 12(1)(b) if an epinephrine auto-injector is administered to a child: or

4. An emergency or rescue medication for a child in care, such as medication to respond to diabetic or asthmatic condition, as prescribed by the child's physician. Emergency or rescue medication shall be inaccessible to a child in care;

(b) Kept in the original bottle; and

(c) Properly labeled.

(7) Medication shall not be given to a child if the medication's expiration date has passed.

Findings:

General: Based on observation, a caregiver's bottle of insulin was not labeled or stored in a locked place located in the refrigerator in the infants' room. A tube of Hydrocortisone Cream 1% was not labeled to indicate whom it belonged to located in a medication box stored in a filing cabinet in the office. Also, an Epinephrine auto-injector was on a desk in the center's office. The center's office door was opened and the Epinephrine auto-injector was accessible to three and four-year-olds' class.

General: Based on observation, a seven (7) foot long piece of black, fabric weed block was above the mulch on the younger children's outdoor play area.

General: Based on observation, ten (10) cribs were less than twelve (12) inches apart from each other in the infants' room.

Findings:

General: Based on observation, The children's lunch requirement was not met in the three and four-year-olds' room. Five (5) children did not have a second vegetable and/or a fruit, four (4) children did not have bread, nine (9) children were served apple juice, and one (1) child did not have a vegetable or fruit. The children's lunch requirement was not met in the two-year-olds' room. Four (4) children did not have a second vegetable and/or a fruit, two (2) children did not have fruit or a vegetable, and four (4) children did not have bread. The children's lunch requirement was not met in the two and three-year-olds' room. Three (3) children did not have a second vegetable and/or a fruit, two (2) children did not have a fruit or a vegetable, and four (4) children did not have bread. The children's lunch requirement was not met in the two and three-year-olds' room. Three (3) children did not have a second vegetable and/or a fruit, two (2) children did not have a fruit or a vegetable, and four (4) children did not have bread. General: Based on observation, the schedule of daily activities posted in the infants' room determined breakfast was served at 7:30 a.m., lunch at 10:35 a.m., and snack at 2:50 p.m. There was more than a three (3) hour time between a meal or snack. The schedule of daily activities posted in the two-year-olds' room, two and three-year-olds' room, and three and four-year-olds' room determined breakfast was served at 7:30 a.m., lunch at 11:30 a.m., and snack at 3:00 p.m. There was more than a three (3) hour time between a meal or snack. Findings:

General: Based on observation and review of documentation, two (2) caregivers hired on 7/5/16 and 4/6/18, had a professional development plan on file dated 8/29/18; a caregiver hired on 2/20/17, had a professional development plan on file dated 8/30/18; a caregiver hired on 7/15/16, had a professional development plan on file dated 8/30/17, and a caregiver hired on 1/16/19, did not have a professional development plan.

1175 - Earthquake/Tornado/Fire Drills

922 KAR 2:090. Section 9. Records.

(1) A child-care center shall maintain:

(h) A written record of quarterly practiced earthquake drills and tornado drills detailing the date, time, and children who participated in accordance with 922 KAR 2:120, Section 3;

(i) A written record of practiced fire drills conducted monthly detailing the date, time, and children who participated in accordance with 922 KAR 2:120, Section 3;

Findings:

General: Based on observation, interview and review of documentation, the center did not have a written record of the names of the children who participated in the fire drills during January through June 2019. Also, the center did not have a written record of the names of the children who participated in the earthquake and tornado drills during the first and second quarters of 2019.
