225 - Licensee Responsibility

922 KAR 2:090. Section 8. General.

(1) A licensee shall:

(a) Be responsible for the operation of the child-care center pursuant to this administrative regulation, 922 KAR 2:120, and 922 KAR 2:280; and (b) Protect and assure the health, safety, and comfort of each child.

Findings:

General: Based on observation, interview and review of documentation, the child care center failed to assure the health, safety and comfort of the children at the child care center. Five (5) children were given Melatonin, a sleep aid supplement, without a daily written request from the parent. Review of the child care center's medication cabinet revealed a bottle labeled with the following information: Kroger Melatonin adult gummies five (5) milligrams. Interview with the staff in charge revealed the bottle of Melatonin that was observed in the medication cabinet was the same supplement that was given to the children at the child care center. Review of documentation revealed only parents of two (2) children initially provided written approval for the supplement to be administered; however, the written approval was merely jotted on a paper that was not an identified medication permission form. The initial approval lacked details indicating dates and times the supplement should be administered. The documentation for one (1) of the children revealed the child care center was only to give the child one (1) milligram of Melatonin. Multiple interviews revealed the child was given one (1) five (5) milligram Melatonin gummy on more than one (1) occasion. The other three (3) children given Melatonin were: 1. the grandchild of a staff member and child of another staff member; 2. the child of a staff members.

(4) Prescription and nonprescription medication shall be administered to a child in care:

(a)1. With a written request of the child's parent or the child's prescribing health professional; and

2. According to the directions or instructions on the medication's label; or

(b) For epinephrine, in accordance with KRS 199.8951 and 311.646.

Findings:

General: Based on interview and review of documentation, five (5) children were administered five (5) milligrams of Melatonin at the child care center before nap time without obtaining a written daily request from the parent before the sleep aid supplement was administered to each child. The label on the bottle of the administered supplement identified the product as a product intended for adults.

770 - Medication Administration Record

(5) The child-care center shall keep a written record of the administration of medication, including:

- (a) Time of each dosage;
- (b) Date;
- (c) Amount:
- (d) Name of staff person giving the medication;

Findings:

General: Upon request, a written record of the administration of medication, including the time of each dose, the date, the dosage amount, the name of the staff person administering the medication, the name of the child and the name of the medication was not presented for four (4) children on the day of the inspection. Interview revealed that Melatonin, a sleep aid supplement, had been administered to at least five (5) children in the past. Interview with a staff member revealed that she administered Melatonin to three (3) children on the day of the inspection. However, the staff member revealed that the medication that was administered for each child was not recorded.

General: Observation of the infant/one-year-old room revealed there was an infant asleep in a swing. Therefore, the sleeping infant was not provided with a crib for rest time. Interview with the staff member revealed the infant was eight (8) weeks old.

Findings:

General: At 11:36a.m., three (3) school-age children arrived to the child care center during the time that lunch was being served. The school-age children did have a lunch with them that was provided by the school system. A child had finished eating his meal that was provided by the school system and asked a staff member if he could have a lunch and pointed with his finger to the plate of a child that was sitting beside him. The staff member told him "No, there is not enough food, I did not know that you all were going to be here today.

General: Observation of the infant/one-year-old room while lunch was being served revealed a staff member brought one (1) tray of food into the classroom that contained a small portion of pears and hamburger helper; later the children were given small pieces of whole wheat bread. The three (3) children that were sitting at a table had already been served an individual cup of milk and an individual spoon. The staff member began to take their hand and scoop a very small portion of food off the tray and place the hamburger helper and pears onto the table in front of each individual child. The children were eating the food off the table. Therefore, the children were not served their lunch food with tableware, to include a plate.
