922 KAR 2:100 - Section 12. Care Requirements for a Provider.

(1) A provider shall ensure the health, safety, and comfort of each child.

Findings:

General: Based on observation, the family child care home failed to comply with regulatory requirements with regard to the health, safety and comfort of a child in care. Observation of the Living Room and Child Care areas revealed uncovered sockets without socket protectors, staples in the carpet, a silver clip on the floor, a AA battery in the Living Room area on a couch cushion and small change such as dimes and pennies on the floor. Further observation revealed a toddler and two (2) preschool-aged children in care.

85 - Record Maintenance Not In Compliance

922 KAR 2:100 - Section 18. Records.

(6) A certified family child-care home provider shall keep all records for five (5) years.

Findings:

120 - Information to Parents

General: Based on review of documentation and interview, the family child care home failed to comply with regulatory requirements with regard to record maintenance. Upon request, the family child care home provider failed to provide provider records for herself and staff with a hire date 07/10/14, to include criminal records checks, child abuse or neglect (CA/N) checks, tuberculosis documentation and first aid/CPR certification.

The certified family child-care home provider shall: (2) Make available a copy of the certification standards to each parent;

(3) Provide each parent with the name, address, and telephone number of the cabinet for the purpose of registering a complaint if the parent believes the family child-care home provider is not meeting the standards;

Findings

General: Based on review of documentation and interview, the family child care home director failed to assure compliance with regulatory requirements with regard to information to parents. Review of written documentation revealed the certification standards were not made available to parents and the version on record was printed in 2010 and was not the current certification standards. Interview with the provider revealed she was not aware that the certification standards changed after 2010.

Provider Records

135 - Provider CPR/First Aid Not In Compliance

922 KAR 2:100 - Section 2. Certification Process.

- (4) An applicant shall be currently certified by an agency approved in accordance with 922 KAR 2:240 in infant and child:
- (a) Cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR); and
- (b) First aid.

Findings:

General: Based on review of documentation and interview, the family child care home failed to maintain employee records in accordance with regulatory requirements. Upon request, the family child care home provider failed to provide evidence of current cabinet approved Infant and Child First aid and Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) certification.

140 - Adult in home/Assistant Not In Complianc

922 KAR 2:100 - Section 2. Certification Process.

- (5) An adult living in the home of the applicant present during the hours of operation, or having unsupervised contact with a child in care, and the applicant's assistant shall submit to the cabinet:
- (a) A criminal records check pursuant to KRS 17.165(5) by the Kentucky State Police or the Administrative Office of the Courts within a year prior to application:
- (b) A OIG-DRCC-04 to complete:
 - 1. A child abuse or neglect check using the central registry in accordance with 922 KAR 1:470; and
 - 2. An address check of Sex Offender Registry;
- (c) A criminal records check completed once for any previous state of residence if:
 - 1. The adult resided outside the state of Kentucky in the last five (5) years; and
 - 2. No criminal records check has been completed for the adult's previous state of residence; and

Findings:

General: Based on review of documentation and interview, the family child care home failed to maintain employee records in accordance with regulatory requirements. Upon request, the family child care home provider failed to provide documented evidence of criminal records check pursuant to KRS 17.165 (5) and certified family child-care home central registry check

145 - Adult in home/Assistant TB

922 KAR 2:100 - Section 2. Certification Process.

- (5) An adult living in the home of the applicant present during the hours of operation, or having unsupervised contact with a child in care, and the applicant's assistant shall submit to the cabinet:
- (d) A copy of negative tuberculin results or a health professional's statement documenting that the adult is free of active tuberculosis.

Findings:

General: Based on review of documentation and interview, the family child care home failed to maintain employee records in accordance with regulatory requirements. Upon request, the family child care home provider failed to provide documented evidence of a negative tuberculin result or a health professional's statement that the provider and staff with a hire date of 07/10/14 are free of active tuberculosis.

150 - Orientation/training plan

Findings:

General: Based on review of documentation and interview, the family child care home failed to maintain employee records in accordance with regulatory requirements. Upon request, the family child care home provider failed to provide a written plan for obtaining nine (9) hours of annual cabinet-approved training for staff with a hire date of 07/10/14.

155 - Provider Training Requirements

Findings

General: Based on review of documentation and interview, the family child care home failed to maintain employee records in accordance with regulatory requirements. Upon request, the family child care home provider failed to provide documented evidence that she and staff with a hire date of 07/10/14 completed at least nine (9) hours of cabinet-approved early care and education training. In addition, documentation was not received of one and one-half (1 ½) hours of cabinet approved pediatric abusive head trauma training in accordance with KRS 199.8982(2) for staff with the hire date 07/10/14.

165 - Assistant Training Requirements, if applicable

Findings:

General: Based on review of documentation and interview, the family child care home failed to maintain employee records in accordance with regulatory requirements. Upon request, the family child care home provider failed to provide documented evidence that staff with a hire date of 07/10/14, who also worked in excess of fourteen (14) calendar days during a one (1) year period, completed at least nine (9) hours of cabinet-approved training, including pediatric abusive head trauma training.

- (1) A provider's home and each play area used for child care shall:
- (a) Be free from risk of harm in accordance with the requirements of this administrative regulation;

Findings:

220 - Free from risk of harm

General: Based on observation and interview, the family child care home failed to maintain premises in accordance with regulatory requirements with regard to risk of harm to children in care. Observation of the family care home revealed a child to climb steps which lead from the Child Care and Living Room Area. The steps were not protected by a barrier to prevent a toddler from accessing the stairwell. A toddler was identified to be in care on the date of the survey. In the bathroom, a vent cover was loosely fitted over a vent in the floor and left an open space which presented a risk for a small child to step into the hole and cause possible injury. In addition, upon entrance to the family child care home, the provider indicated she, a toddler and two preschool-aged children, just arrived back into the house from the outdoor play area. Observation of the outdoor play area revealed wire fencing without good repair, areas along the wooden fencing that presented entrapment hazards, cans of paint which were rusted and stored inside a large container filled with stagnant water, a large toy car/vehicle filled with water and exposed electrical wiring in the back of the toy vehicle, a plastic container of hazardous chemicals, and a plastic fender which contained stagnant water.

240 - Harmful Items Inaccessible Not In Compliance

922 KAR 2:100 - Section 11. The General Requirements of the Family Child-Care Home Environment.

- (4) The areas of the home that are accessible to children in care shall be free from items harmful to children including the following items:
- (a) Cleaning supplies, poisons, paints, and insecticides;
- (b) Knives, scissors, and sharp objects;
- (c) Power tools, lawn mowers, hand tools, nails, and other equipment;
- (d) Matches, cigarettes, lighters, combustibles, and flammable liquids;
- (e) Alcoholic beverages;
- (f) Plastic bags; and
- (g) Litter and rubbish.

Findings:

General: Based on observation, the family child care home failed to maintain premises in accordance with regulatory requirements with regard to inaccessible items. Observation of the family care home bathroom revealed a perfume spray bottle on the back of the toilet seat and a sharp razor in the tub area in accessible reach of children who were observed to enter the bathroom alone. In addition, "Clorox" bleach was in accessible reach of children. Further observation of the outdoor play area revealed cans of paint which were rusted and stored inside a large container filled with stagnant water, a plastic container of hazardous chemicals, soiled diapers, litter and rubbish.

250 - Covered Outlets Not In Compliance

922 KAR 2:100 - Section 11. The General Requirements of the Family Child-Care Home Environment.

(6) Electrical outlets not in use shall be covered.

Findings:

General: Based on observation, the family child care home failed to maintain premises in accordance with regulatory requirements with regard to covered outlets. Observation of the Living Room and Child Care areas revealed electrical outlets/sockets without socket protectors.

275 - Stairs Blocked, if applicable

922 KAR 2:100 - Section 11. The General Requirements of the Family Child-Care Home Environment.

(11) If an infant or toddler is in the care of a provider, indoor stairs with more than two (2) steps shall be blocked.

Findings:

General: Based on observation and interview, the family child care home failed to maintain premises in accordance with regulatory requirements with regard to blocked stairs. Observation of the family child care home revealed indoor stairs with more than two (2) steps. The stairwell did not contain a gate or barrier and children were observed to crawl on the steps. Interview with the provider revealed a toddler was in care.

285 - Condition of Home Not In Compliance

922 KAR 2:100 - Section 11. The General Requirements of the Family Child-Care Home Environment.

- (21) A family child-care home shall:
- (a) Be clean:
- (b) Be uncluttered;
- (c) Be free of insects and rodents;

Findings:

General: Based on observation, the family child care home failed to maintain premises in accordance with regulatory requirements. Observation of the family child care home revealed accumulation of dirt and debris in carpeted areas, papers, toys throughout the Living Room and Child Care Area, trash (bags of uneaten snacks), unclean and unsanitized bathroom area and ceiling fans which contained a large degree of dust. The kitchen area revealed unclean dishes in the sink and clutter. The provider was observed to prepare snacks in an unclean kitchen.

295 - Bathroom sanitary Not In Compliance

922 KAR 2:100 - Section 11. The General Requirements of the Family Child-Care Home Environment.

- (21) A family child-care home shall:
- (e) Have bathrooms, including toilets, sinks, and potty chairs that are:
- 1. Sanitary; and
- 2. In good working condition.

Findings:

General: Based on observation, the family child care home failed to maintain premises in accordance with regulatory requirements. Observation of the family child care home revealed accumulation of dirt and debris in the bathroom area. The toilet and sink areas had not been properly sanitized and the toilet seat was broken and not in good repair. Personal items of the provider were accessible to the children who were observed to enter the bathroom alone.

305 - Garbage Stored Appropriately

Not In Compliance

922 KAR 2:100 - Section 11. The General Requirements of the Family Child-Care Home Environment.

(23) Indoor and outdoor garbage shall be stored in a waterproof container with a tight-fitting cover.

Findings:

General: Based on observation, the family child care home failed to maintain premises in accordance with regulatory requirements. Observation of the kitchen area of the family child care home revealed garbage containers without tight-fitting covers.

310 - Toilet Room Not In Compliance

922 KAR 2:100 - Section 13. Toilet and Diapering Requirements.

- (1) A toilet room shall:
- (a) Have an adequate supply of toilet paper; and
- (b) Be cleaned and sanitized daily.

Findings:

General: Based on observation, the family child care home failed to maintain premises in accordance with regulatory requirements. Observation of the family child care home bathroom revealed accumulation of dirt and debris which suggested the bathroom was not cleaned and sanitized on a daily basis.

320 - Toilet Not In Compliance

922 KAR 2:100 - Section 13. Toilet and Diapering Requirements.

- (3) Each toilet shall:
- (a) Be kept in clean condition;
- (b) Be kept in good repair;
- (c) Be in a lighted room; and
- (d) Have ventilation.

Findings:

General: Based on observation, the family child care home failed to maintain premises in accordance with regulatory requirements. Observation of the toilet area of the bathroom revealed a broken toilet seat, as well as unclean and unsanitized surfaces.

Hygienic Practices Not In Compliance

330 - Child Handwashing Not In Compliance

922 KAR 2:100 - Section 12. Care Requirements for a Provider.

- (4) A child shall wash hands with liquid soap and warm running water:
- (a) Before and after eating or handling food;
- (b) After toileting or diaper change;
- (c) After handling animals;
- (d) After wiping or blowing nose;
- (e) After touching items soiled with body fluids or waste; and
- (f) After outdoor and indoor play time.

Findings:

General: Based on observation, the family child care home failed to comply with hygienic practices in accordance with regulatory requirements. Observation of the family child care home child hand washing practices revealed the provider failed to wash the hands of a toddler upon completion of a diaper change. Children were observed to use the toilet without properly washing their hands. The provider also failed to allow the children to wash their hands before and after eating snack and after outdoor and indoor play time.

355 - Soiled Diapers/Clothing Not In Compliance

922 KAR 2:100 - Section 13. Toilet and Diapering Requirements.

- (7) Diapers or clothing shall be:
- (a) Changed when soiled or wet;
- (b) Stored in a covered leak proof container temporarily; and
- (c) Washed or disposed of at least once a day.

Findings:

General: Based on observation, the family child care home failed to comply with hygienic practices in accordance with regulatory requirements. Observation of family child care home revealed uncovered trash containers, one of which contained soiled diapers. In addition, soiled diapers were observed on the ground in the outdoor play area.

365 - Diapering Space Not In Compliance

922 KAR 2:100 - Section 13. Toilet and Diapering Requirements.

- (9) If a child is being diapered, the child shall:
- (b) Be placed on a surface that is:
- 1. Clean:
- 2. Padded:
- 3. Free of holes, rips, tears, or other damage;
- 4. Nonabsorbent;
- 5. Easily cleaned; and
- 6. Free of items not used for diaper changing.

Findings:

General: Based on observation, the family child care home failed to comply with hygienic practices in accordance with regulatory requirements. Observation of a diaper change revealed a child was diapered on a bath towel on the floor of the Living Room area. The bath towel is considered to be absorbent and without padding.

375 - Diapering Practice Not In Compliance

922 KAR 2:100 - Section 13. Toilet and Diapering Requirements.

- (11) A provider or an assistant shall disinfect the diapering surface after each child is diapered.
- (12) If a provider or an assistant wear disposable gloves, the gloves shall be changed and disposed of after each child is diapered.

Findings:

General: Based on observation, the family child care home failed to comply with hygienic practices in accordance with regulatory requirements. Observation of a diaper change revealed a child was diapered on a bath towel on the floor of the Living Room area. The floor of the Living Room contained dirt and debris within the carpet.

First Aid/Medication Not In Compliance

390 - First Aid supplies accessible

- (4) A provider shall:
- (a) Maintain first aid supplies that are easily accessible for use in an emergency, and these supplies shall be inaccessible to the children in care; and

Findings:

General: Based on review of documentation and interview, the family child care home failed to comply with regulatory requirements regarding first aid and/or medication. Upon request, the family child care home provider failed to provide evidence of first aid supplies when children were transported. Interview with the provider revealed "Band-Aids" were the only first aid items in the vehicle.

400 - First Aid Supplies Not In Compliance

922 KAR 2:100 - Section 15. Medication and First Aid.

- (5) First aid supplies shall include a fully-equipped first aid kit containing the following non-expired items:
- (a) Liquid soap;
- (b) Adhesive bandages;
- (c) Sterile gauze;
- (d) Medical tape;
- (e) Scissors;
- (f) Thermometer;
- (g) Flashlight; (h) Cold pack;
- (i) First-aid book;
- (j) Disposable gloves; and

410 - Outdoor Play Area Safe

(k) CPR mouthpiece.

Findings:

General: Based on observation and interview, the family child care home failed to comply with regulatory requirements regarding first aid and/or medication. Upon request, the family child care home provider failed to provide a flashlight, thermometer and first aid book which were the missing items in the home's first aid kit.

Outdoor Play Area Not In Compliance

922 KAR 2:100 - Section 11. The General Requirements of the Family Child-Care Home Environment.

(13) An outdoor play area shall be free of unavoidable danger or risk.

Findings:

General: Based on observation, the family child care home failed to maintain an outdoor play area in accordance with regulatory requirements. Observation of the outdoor play area revealed rusted wire fencing without good repair, areas along the wooden fencing that presented entrapment hazards, cans of paint which were rusted and stored inside a large container filled with stagnant water, a large toy car/vehicle filled with water and exposed electrical wiring in the back of the toy vehicle, a plastic container of hazardous chemicals, and a plastic fender which contained stagnant water. Further observation revealed broken tree limbs throughout the back yard play area and insufficient protective surfacing around a large climbing apparatus.

Findings:

General: Based on observation, the family child care home failed to maintain an outdoor play area in accordance with regulatory requirements. Observation of the outdoor play area revealed a large climbing apparatus which was not securely anchored to the ground and was determined to be inappropriate and unsafe for children in care.

Equipment

922 KAR 2:100 - Section 11. The General Requirements of the Family Child-Care Home Environment.

- (9) Equipment and toys shall be:
- (a) Designated by the manufacturer as developmentally appropriate to the age of children in care;
- (b) In sufficient quantity for the number of children in care; and
- (c) Safe, sound, clean, and in good repair.

Findings:

General: Based on observation, the family child care home failed to maintain equipment in accordance with regulatory requirements. Observation of the outdoor play area revealed a large climbing apparatus which was missing pieces and determined to be without good repair. In addition, a large toy car/vehicle was observed with exposed electrical wiring and filled with water. Further observation revealed unclean toys strolled across the playground.

Findings:

General: Based on review of documentation, the family child care home failed to comply with regulatory requirements regarding transportation. Upon request, the family child care home provider failed to provide written permission from a parent to transport his or her child.

470 - Valid driver's license Not In Compliance

922 KAR 2:100 - Section 17. Transportation.

- (1) If transportation is provided or arranged by the certified family child-care home provider, the provider shall:
- (d) Have a valid driver's license issued by the Division of Motor Vehicles;

Findings:

General: Based on review of documentation, the family child care home failed to comply with regulatory requirements regarding transportation. Upon request, the family child care home provider failed to provide a valid driver's license issued by the Division of Motor Vehicles.

475 - Emergency/identifying info

Not In Compliance

922 KAR 2:100 - Section 17. Transportation.

- (1) If transportation is provided or arranged by the certified family child-care home provider, the provider shall:
- (e) Have emergency and identification information about each child in the vehicle if children are being transported; and

Findings:

General: Based on review of documentation, the family child care home failed to comply with regulatory requirements regarding transportation. Upon request, the family child care home provider failed to provide documented evidence stored in the transportation vehicle of emergency and identification information about each child transported.

480 - Laws for driver's license/insurance

- (f) Conform to state laws pertaining to vehicles, driver's license, and insurance pursuant to KRS 186.020.

Findings

General: Based on review of documentation, the family child care home failed to comply with regulatory requirements regarding transportation. Upon request, the family child care home provider failed to provide documented evidence of vehicle insurance for the transportation vehicle used to transport children in care.

720 - Driver Requirements Not In Compliance

922 KAR 2:100 - Section 17. Transportation.

- (9) A driver of a vehicle transporting a child for a certified provider shall:
- (a) Be at least twenty-one (21) years old;
- (b) Complete:
 - 1. The background checks described in Section 2(2)(c)5 or 2(5) of this administrative regulation; and
 - 2. An annual check of the:
 - a. Kentucky driver history records in accordance with KRS 186.018; or
 - b. Driver history records through the state transportation agency that issued the driver's license;
- (c) Hold a current driver's license that has not been suspended or revoked during the last five (5) years; and
- (d) Not caused an accident which resulted in the death of a person.

Findings:

General: Based on review of documentation and interview, the family child care home failed to comply with regulatory requirements regarding transportation. Upon request, the provider failed to provide written documentation of a completed Kentucky Driver History report from the state transportation agency that issued the driver's license. In addition, the provider failed to provide evidence of completed criminal record and child abuse or neglect (CA/N) background checks.

Findings:

General: Based on observation, the family child care home failed to maintain food service in accordance with regulatory requirements. Observation of the kitchen area revealed unclean and cluttered surfaces when the provider prepared and served food.

555 - Weekly Menu Not In Compliance

922 KAR 2:100 - Section 14. Food Requirements.

- (10) A weekly menu shall be:
- (a) Prepared;
- (b) Dated;
- (c) Posted in a conspicuous place; and
- (d) Kept on file for thirty (30) calendar days.

Findings

General: Based on review of documentation and interview, the family child care home failed to maintain food service in accordance with regulatory requirements. Upon request, the family child care home provider failed to provide written documentation of a current weekly menu, prepared, dated, and posted in a conspicuous place. The menu posted on 08/24/17 in the Child Care Area revealed a date of June 2017. In addition, the provider failed to provide the menu for the month of July 2017.

- e. The name and phone number of each person to be contacted in an emergency situation involving or impacting the child;
- f. Authorization by the parent for the provider to seek emergency medical care for the child in the parent's absence; and

Findings:

General: Based on review of documentation and interview, the family child care home failed to maintain children's records in accordance with regulatory requirements. Upon request, the family child care home provider failed to provide a written record of emergency contact and emergency authorization for three (3) children with enrollment dates 06/01/17. In addition, written documentation for one (1) of the children did not indicate a family physician, which should have been identified by the parent or legal guardian at enrollment.

600 - Permission for trips off premises

Findings:

General: Based on review of documentation and interview, the family child care home failed to maintain children's records in accordance with regulatory requirements.
